HISTORY OF THE ATHERTON FAMILY & FOUNDATION

JULIETTE M. ATHERTON

Juliette M. Atherton, the widow of Joseph B. Atherton, expressed her commitment to the welfare of the people of Hawaii with the creation of the Juliette M. Atherton Trust. On December 21, 1915, Mrs. Atherton transferred 20 percent of the outstanding shares of the Atherton Estate to her children, Charles H. Atherton, Mary A. Richards, and Frank C. Atherton. The 1,500 shares would be held in trust to continue the charitable work that Mrs. Atherton was vitally interested in throughout her life.

Mrs. Atherton originally retained the right to amend or revoke the trust. In 1921, the trust became an irrevocable charitable trust when she gave up her rights and amended the governing documents. This action was taken in recognition of the exemplary service performed by the trustees, and that they and succeeding trustees would perpetuate the trust's philanthropic purposes as intended by Mrs. Atherton. The deed directed that the trust income be used for:

"...grants, loans, and other forms of payment toward assisting in the establishment, maintenance, or promotion of such religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific, or other purposes, works, or enterprises, whether public or private, including schools, colleges, hospitals, asylums, homes, and the like institutions and objects for the public benefit, and including also the support and education of individuals during their attendance at any educational institution, and whether to corporations, associations, or other organizations or any private individual or individuals, as the Trustees shall in each case in their discretion and of their own volition approve."

FRANK C. ATHERTON

Frank C. Atherton, business executive and philanthropist, was born in Honolulu on July 1, 1877. He was the son of industrialist Joseph B. Atherton and Juliette M. Atherton, daughter of pioneer American missionaries to Hawaii. Mr. Atherton attended Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut. Upon his return to Hawaii, he entered the world of finance and later became interested in industry. Like his forebears, he devoted much of his time to religious and civic works. On December 24, 1935, 10 years prior to his death, he established the Frank C. Atherton Trust to continue his support of religious, educational, and charitable programs and organizations. Grants and donations from the Frank C. Atherton Trust were primarily used to support charitable projects and programs in the state of Hawaii. In accordance with the purposes, expressed in the trust agreement, grants were for:

"...the making of donations, contributions, subscriptions, loans, and other forms of payment or toward assisting the establishment, maintenance and/or promotion of such religious, scientific, educational, and other charitable purposes and enterprises whether public or private, including churches, societies, schools, colleges, hospitals, asylums, homes, and like institutions and objects [for the public benefit."

Mr. Atherton appointed Eleanore S. Atherton, Marjory A. Wightman, and himself as Trustees.



HISTORY OF THE ATHERTON FAMILY & FOUNDATION

In 1975, the trustees of the Juliette M. Atherton Trust initiated action, which resulted in the creation of the Atherton Family Foundation, a nonprofit corporation organized in the state of Hawaii. A charter of incorporation was granted on November 4, 1975. The trustees then voted unanimously to transfer all investment property and income of the trust to the Atherton Family Foundation and transfer instruments were executed in January 1976. In December 1976, the trustees voted unanimously to transfer the property of the Frank C. Atherton Trust to the Atherton Family Foundation and executed appropriate instruments shortly thereafter.

Historically, the policies, the type of requests considered, and the primary fields of interest of the Juliette M. Atherton Trust and the Frank C. Atherton Trust were similar in nature. Both trusts considered educational programs and institutions the highest priority, and gave careful attention to religious organizations and health and social services.

The consolidation of the two trusts fulfilled several objectives: to provide more efficient administration, to allow greater flexibility in foundation policies, to increase protection and growth of the investment assets, and to increase the number of members and directors.

The diversity of the directors’ perceptions and experiences has enhanced the Foundation’s capacity to respond to the community and broadened its representation of charitable interests.

The Atherton Family Foundation is now one of the largest endowed grantmaking private resources in the state of Hawaii devoted exclusively to the support of charitable activities. It perpetuates the philanthropic commitment expressed during the lifetimes of Juliette M. Atherton and Frank C. Atherton, and of the family who have followed them.

HONORING THE LEGACY OF PAST DIRECTORS

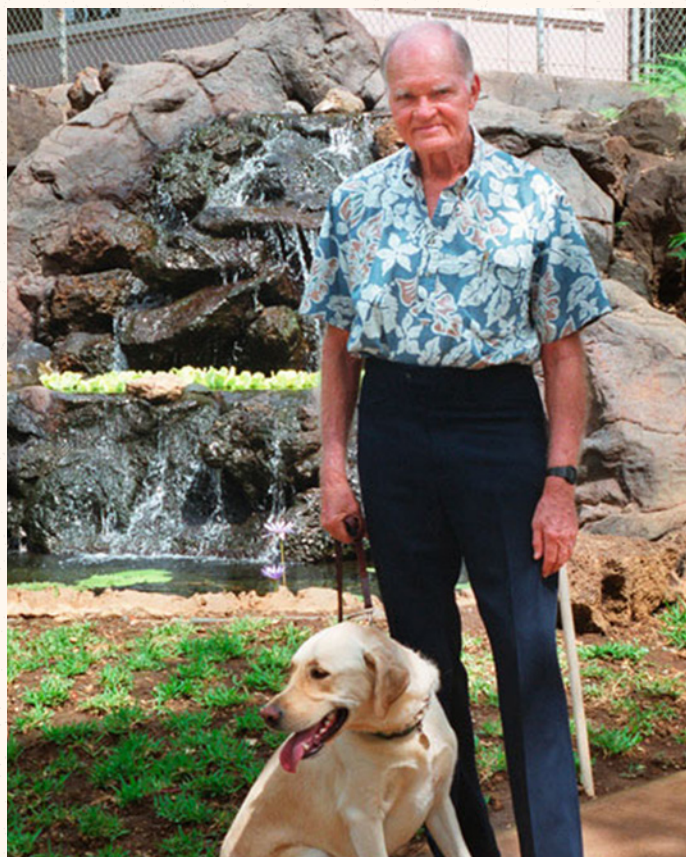
ROBERT RICHARDS MIDKIFF & ROBIN STARR MIDKIFF

This year, the Foundation highlights the work and lives of two past Directors, the father-daughter duo of Robert Richards Midkiff and Robin Starr Midkiff.

ROBERT RICHARDS MIDKIFF

Robert Richards Midkiff (1920–2014) served on the Atherton Family Foundation Board of Directors for 31 years, serving as one of the first Board members and long-time President. The great-great-grandson of missionaries Amos Starr and Juliet Montague Cooke, who arrived in Hawaii in 1837, Robert had deep ties to the islands. He graduated from Punahou School in 1938, then continued his education with a bachelor's degree with high honors from Yale University in 1942, and Harvard's Graduate School of Business Advanced Management Program in 1962. Robert's business accolades include holding top positions in several companies, and as owner and president of American Trust Company of Hawaii, chairman of Bishop Trust Company, Ltd., and president of American Security Bank. A U.S. Army Second Lieutenant, Robert served during World War II on the staff of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander of the Allied Forces in the Pacific.

Perhaps even more than his business accomplishments, Robert was known for his many philanthropic works. He helped found the Friends of Iolani Palace, the Hawaii Community Foundation, the Downtown Improvement Association, and the Waikiki Improvement Association. He served as president of the Hawaii Theatre, restoring the historic structure that is now an iconic part of downtown Honolulu, and led the Good Beginnings Alliance, a nonprofit devoted to early childhood education. Further influencing the design of downtown, Robert joined



then-City Councilman George M. "Scotty" Koga to co-chair the committee that selected the design for the state Capitol, and his involvement planning the Honolulu Civic Center helped spark a renaissance downtown. Robert won the Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Small Business Council of America in 2006, and the following year received another national honor, the Fred Rogers Leadership Award in Philanthropy for Children, Youth and Families. In 2021, the state Senate honored Robert with a resolution lauding his impact on the Aloha State as, "a leader and mainstay in the development of modern Hawaii since statehood."

HONORING THE LEGACY OF PAST DIRECTORS

ROBIN STARR MIDKIFF

There is no question that Robert passed on his love of Hawaii and care for its people to his daughter, Robin Starr Midkiff (1950–2023). Robin succeeded her father as a Foundation Director in 2007 and served on the Board for 16 years. In addition to her missionary heritage on her father's side, on her mother's side she was a descendant of Paul Neumann, who defended Queen Liliuokalani at her trial and served as her personal attorney. The Queen embroidered his name on the quilt she made, which is now at Iolani Palace. Robin attended Kahala Elementary, Punahou School (class of 1968), and Stanford University, then developed her business career in San Francisco at Wells Fargo Bank, then in Honolulu with Chase Bank and First Hawaiian Bank.

Robin also had great accomplishments in volunteer work. Robin served as the Board President for the Washington Place Foundation, Hawaiian Mission Houses Historic Site and Archives, and Bishop Museum, three notable organizations dedicated to preserving Hawaii's history. She was an active member of the Daughters of Hawaii and the National Society of Colonial Dames of America. In addition to Hawaii's history, Robin became very interested in environmental causes and joined the Nature Conservancy and Conservation International. She was very proud of the Atherton Family Foundation's support for the Polynesian Voyaging Society and for the translation of the Hawaiian Bible, the "Baibala Project."

The Atherton Family Foundation is grateful for the legacies Robert and Robin have left for Hawaii and the Foundation.

2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

INNOVATIONS IN EDUCATION TO MEET COMMUNITY NEED

The Atherton Family Foundation continues its mission to support nonprofit organizations throughout Hawaii. In 2022, the Foundation awarded \$5.18 million in grants to organizations in a broad range of fields including nature conservation, arts and culture, youth development, and human services, to enhance Hawaii and the lives of its residents.

As Hawaii exited the pandemic in 2022, education processes adapted to blend previous best practices with new needs and accessibility. Those involved with education have always strived to be leaders in what they could provide for their participants, whether through traditional programs for K-12 school students or continuing education opportunities for community members. 2022 saw the Atherton Family Foundation supporting innovative programs and capital projects that carried the best lessons for adaptability and accessibility from the pandemic into the “new normal,” helping pave the way for education and continued community growth for years to come.

2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

ISLAND SCHOOL

Island School began its educational legacy in 1977 in an old plantation store in Kealia, on the east side of Kauai. Since then, Island School has operated as both a PK-8 and PK-12 institution, weathered Hurricane Iniki, moved the campus to its current Puhi location, and continued expanding both its student body and its facilities. The class of 2022 graduated 42 students, double the entire student body during Island School's first years in Kealia. Almost 100 percent of all graduates attend four-year colleges.

In 2022, Island School's K-12 enrollment was 477 students, well above its 390 infrastructure limits. With the need for space highlighted by COVID-19 health precautions, the Foundation awarded Island School a capital grant to support the construction of a new six-classroom building for its middle and high school students. The new building includes a multipurpose innovation "maker space," which can be utilized in unique ways to encourage creativity and collaboration. The classrooms have mobile friendly furniture, large digital screens and technology access, coupled with natural lighting to connect students to Hawaii's special environment. The new space allows Island School to offer additional technology-based opportunities and advanced design and engineering classes, as well as gives more room for educational opportunities open to the over 3,500 families and community members Island School serves.



2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

THE MERWIN CONSERVANCY

The Merwin Conservancy (TMC) was founded in 2010 by U.S. Poet Laureate and ecologist W.S. Merwin and his wife, Paula, with the purpose of stewarding and sharing the extraordinary 18-acre palm forest Merwin planted on Maui by hand over 40 years. In 2013, TMC started one of its seminal programs, the Green Room Arts and Ecology Salon Series, hosting talks and readings by scientists, Pulitzer-Prize winners, MacArthur Fellows, U.S. Poet Laureates, and visionaries from Hawaii and beyond.

After switching to a virtual platform for the Green Room during the pandemic, TMC received a grant from the Foundation for its 2022 season to blend previous intimate in-person offerings with the wide-reach of virtual programs. TMC hosted four in-person Green Room events that were professionally recorded and edited, then released virtually and free of charge within days of the event. TMC staff engaged with viewers in real time through chats and feedback, reaching new audience members across Hawaii and the continental United States. The in-person meetings were filled with the excitement of reconnecting, while the online presentations broadened the accessibility of TMC's programs. As one participant noted, the Green Room left them, "strengthened in my belief in poetry's power to do so much—heal, strengthen, inspire."



2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

PALI MOMI FOUNDATION

Pali Momi Foundation (PMF) is the philanthropic arm of Pali Momi Medical Center, the only facility serving central and west Oahu with life-saving specialty care, including a stroke center, Level III trauma center, and an interventional cardiac catheterization unit. In recent years, healthcare organizations across the state have experienced dramatic understaffing of non-physician jobs. The need for certified healthcare workers was felt pre-pandemic, then exacerbated during the pandemic as Hawaii-based organizations had to hire over 650 workers from outside the state.

A 2022 grant from the Foundation helped PMF expand its “Clinical Training for Teens” program, a system wide effort across the medical centers that are part of Hawaii Pacific Health. PMF partnered with 13 high schools including Title I schools to offer training, certification, and employment for Medical Assistant, Nurse Aid and Phlebotomy positions. The courses were offered to juniors and seniors with no tuition costs, and with opportunities to receive employment immediately upon completion of their program. 309 students participated in clinical education programs and outreach events, including 21 students from the Medical Assistant program and 72 students from the Nurse Aid program who achieved certifications to work in their chosen positions. In creating this training pipeline, PMF encourages local students to achieve higher education and professional careers, while filling a critical staffing need through a homegrown solution.

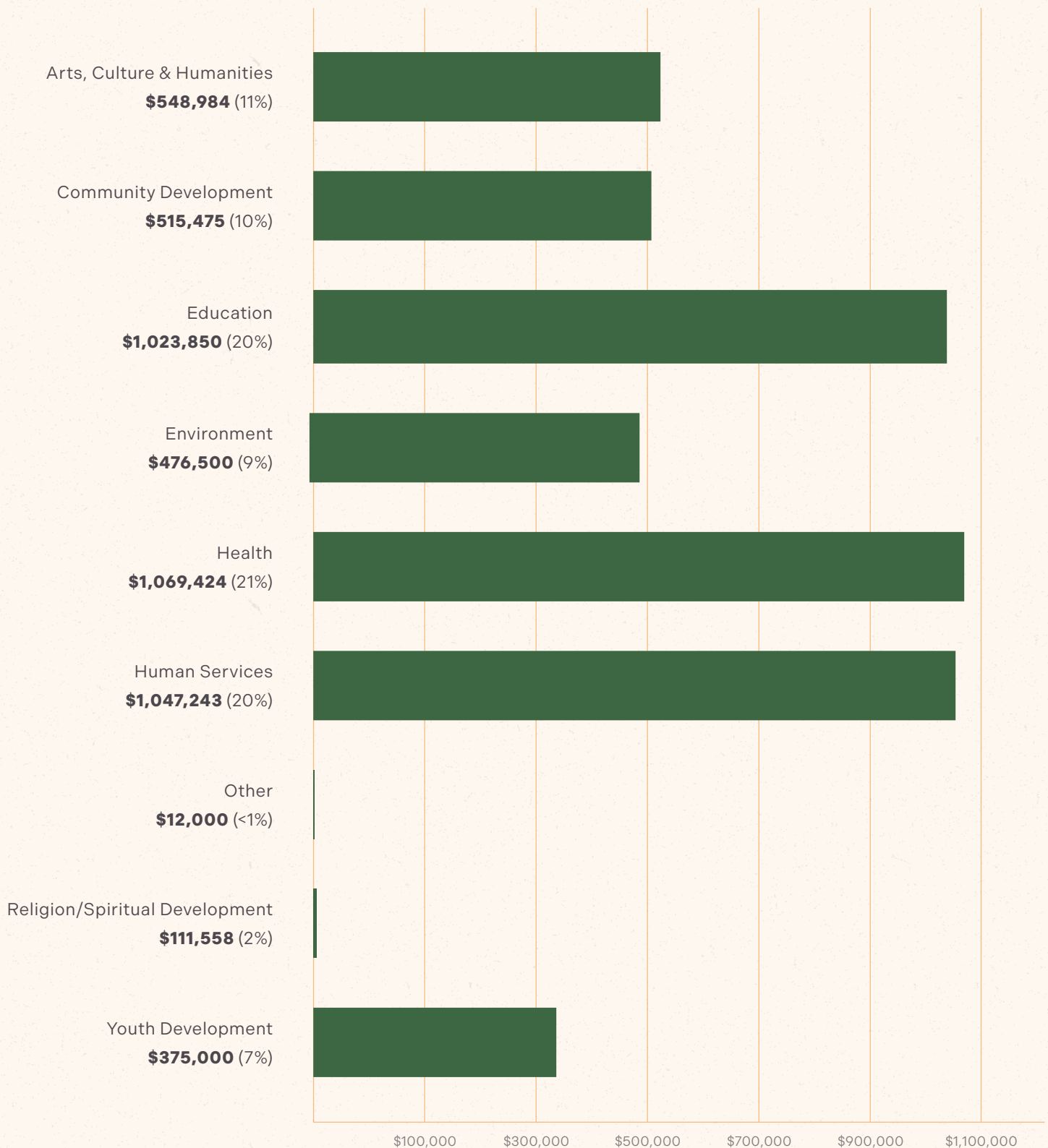

GRANT APPLICATION GUIDELINES

The Foundation makes grants for programs and projects that benefit the people of Hawaii. The fields of greatest interest are arts, culture, and humanities; community development; education; environment; health; human services; spiritual development; and youth development.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Juliette M. Atherton Scholarship was named in memory of Mrs. Atherton to ensure the continued association of her name and her special interest in Christianity with the Foundation. The scholarship benefits three categories of individuals: dependent sons or daughters of ordained, active Protestant ministers in Hawaii pursuing undergraduate studies; individuals from Hawaii pursuing graduate theological studies at a Protestant seminary with the goal of ordination; and active, ordained Protestant ministers residing in Hawaii seeking an advanced degree. Scholarship recipients are selected based on their financial need and academic promise.

For the 2022–2023 academic year, scholarship awards totaled \$107,500 to 23 students. The Directors also awarded a grant to support the Stronger Together Hawaii Fund at the Hawaii Community Foundation.

Applications will be available online beginning November 15, 2022, for the 2023–2024 academic year for seminary students, Protestant ministers pursuing advanced degrees, or sons and daughters of Protestant ministers. Application materials, including transcript of grades and essays must be submitted by February 15, 2023.

Advanced degree program applicants must provide the place and date of ordination, and the name of the seminary attended to confirm eligibility.
